Dear Sir,

The Errington Volunteer Fire Dept is requesting approval in principal from the Regional District of Nanaimo for the construction of a communications tower on the property of the #1 Fire Hall at 960 Errington Rd. The proposal is primarily for the financial benefit of the Fire Dept and community of Errington.

In Recent months this site with its current 40 meter antenna has been undergoing a series of testing by our local amateur radio association and they have concluded that the fire hall is situated in an excellent location for optimum radio communication around the central Island area and beyond.

With this information we applied to Nav Canada for permission to construct a tower with the necessary antennas. We have since been granted permission for an 82 meter tower either guyed or free standing which would cost an estimated \$240,000 or \$360,000 respectively.

In the future this tower may be available to enhance existing communication systems such as the 911 system etc, but initially cell phone companies would be sought out because of the potentially high rate of return on the investment.

The revenue generated from this project would initially go towards the capital cost and maintenance of the installation, and then our goal is for the surplus to reduce the annual Fire Dept protection costs incurred to our residents.

Little Mountain communications facility is currently filled to capacity, so the potential for business revenue is definitely here, especially with the planned changes to the laws governing cellular networks.

We are currently working with Palidor Radio Communications Ltd (Vancouver) to design a tower system that would best suit all involved.

We would like the opportunity to appear before the RDN Board as a delegation to provide full information and address any questions the Board may have.

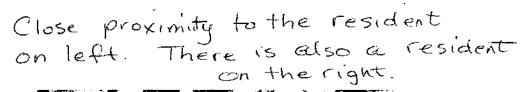

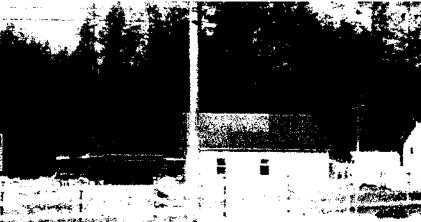

LIQUOR-PRIMARY & LIQUOR-PRIMARY CLUB Letter of Intent Guidelines

Instructions to the Applicant:

In addition to the application form and supporting documents, you must provide a letter of intent describing your proposal. This information will assist the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch (LCLB), and your local government/First Nation in making a decision about your licence application.

Please use the bold topic headings listed below in your Letter of Intent. The information you provide must address all items indicated under each topic. Your application will be considered incomplete if you do not provide a satisfactory letter of intent.

1. Target Market

- Describe the target market your proposed establishment intends to serve, including references to:
- Age groups
- Income levels
- Target populations (e.g. urban locals, rural locals, neighbouring communities, tourists)
- Occupations

2. Hospitality/Tourism Development Factor:

If your proposed establishment focuses on serving a tourist population, describe how it will align with or support tourism activities for the community/region in which it will be located. Your local Chamber of Commerce may be able to provide you with relevant tourism growth statistics and/or a local tourism plan which your proposal aligns with.

3. Benefits to the Community:

Describe the community/market need you are addressing by providing an additional licensed establishment in the community.
 Example: The proposed establishment will be located in a new mixed-use development where businesses, government offices, residences and sport facilities are situated. There are no licensed establishments in the area.

4. Social Facilities and Public Buildings:

- Identify any social facilities and public buildings located in the vicinity of your proposed establishment, and describe where they
 are located in relationship to your proposed establishment.
- Explain how your establishment and its patrons are likely to affect the people attending these facilities.

Social facilities include: youth clubs; facilities for pre-school/day care/after-school care; churches, etc. Public buildings include: local health facilities; schools; recreation facilities; police stations etc.

| Traffic In the Vicinity:

Describe how the addition of your proposed establishment will affect traffic flow in the area of the proposed establishment.
 Explain how any change in traffic flow will affect residents in the area, or those driving through the area.

Examples: increased vehicle traffic; no effect because you are expecting walk-in business; residents will experience greater traffic concestion, traffic noise and decreased street parking availability.

Noise in the Community:

- Describe how the addition of your proposed establishment will affect noise in the community.

Site and Community Assessment

Once we have received and incorporated your additions or changes to the Application Summary, we will send it on to your local government (municipality, regional district, or First Nation), along with additional information about the surrounding community, such as a statistical summary of demographic, economic and market factors.

The local government will then have 90 days to respond (they may, however, ask for an extension if zoning issues are involved). Please see <u>Will I need local government or other approvals to get a licence?</u> for more on this process.

(Once we have received your local government's resolution, we may, in exceptional circumstances only, hold a hearing to consider whether your application has met all regulatory requirements and that the process to date has been fair.)

Building Assessment

If everything is in order, we will send you a letter, saying that we have decided in favour of granting you the licence - but the approval process is not yet finished.

At this point, you will need to submit a final copy of your proposed floor plans, approved by the appropriate local authorities. We will review your plans to make sure they comply with the <u>Liquor</u> <u>Control and Licensing Act</u> and its <u>Regulations</u> and with Liquor Control and Licensing Branch policies on lines of sight, staff control, equipment, etc.

Once we have approved your plans, you can start building, installing signs and equipment, ordering advertising, and so on.

Establishment Inspection and Applicant Interview

Thirty days before you are ready to open you will need to call your local liquor inspector to arrange for an establishment inspection and applicant interview.

At this time, the inspector will go over with you the requirements of the Liquor Control and Licensing. Act and its Regulations, and the specific terms and conditions of your licence.

The inspector will also review your floor plans to make sure actual construction reflects what was submitted with your original building and floor plans, and give you a copy of <u>Liquor-Primary Licence</u> <u>Terms and Conditions: A Guide for Liquor Licensees in British Columbia</u>.

If all is in order, the liquor inspector will ask you to contact our Head Office in Victoria to pay your first-year annual licence fee of \$1,100.00, and we will issue your licence.

8. Commercial/Residential/Light or Heavy Industrial Neighbourhoods

- Describe the composition of commercial, residential and industrial neighbourhoods in the immediate vicinity of your proposed establishment.
- Provide a municipal zoning map identifying these areas and the zoning classification of each.

9. Other Licensed Establishments

- Provide the names and addresses of all licensed establishments, other than restaurants, located within a reasonable distance
 of your proposed establishment.
- Describe what you are using as a reasonable distance.
- For each establishment you have listed, describe the consumer market the establishment currently serves.

Reasonable Distance Guidelines:

- In a densely populated city or municipality, reasonable distance is probably <u>a 2-block radius</u>
- In a pocket community having no adjacent developed regional areas (Gold River, Tumbler Ridge, Whistler, Valemont), reason able distance is probably the whole community
- . In a rural area having large acre parcels, reasonable distance is probably up to five miles
- In a moderately populated area of developed subdivisions, suburbs, probably one mile.

10. Natural or Manmade Barriers

 Describe any large natural barriers (a river, escarpment, mountain etc.) or manmade barriers (railway, vehicle freeway, industrial parks, malls, etc.) between the proposed establishment and other establishments described as being within a reasonable distance.

11. Other Factors

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Will I need local government or other approvals to get a licence? What about the Serving It Right course?

Local government approvals

We will provide your local government (municipality, regional district, or First Nation) with a summary of your application. The local government must then, within 90 days, send us a resolution commenting on your proposed establishment (they may ask for additional time) - sample local government resolutions (RTF) (LCLB024)

This resolution must look at such factors as your establishment's location, proximity to other facilities, the hours you are proposing to stay open, the number of people you plan to accommodate, and the impact on the community if your application is approved. If the local government believes residents may be affected by your establishment, it must also collect local views on your application. This may involve receiving letters in response to a public notice, conducting a public hearing or holding a referendum. Your local government may request additional information.

The local government's resolution must explicitly support your application, or oppose it. (Local governments may choose to opt out of this process. If your local government has opted out, our staff will go through the same steps.)

In addition, you will need to ask the planning department of your local government what the zoning is for your proposed site, and whether the kind of business you propose is permitted within that zone.

You must also ask the local fire and building authorities - your local government can tell you who exactly you need to talk to - to review your proposed floor plans both for safety and to provide you with an "occupant load" calculation. The occupant load must equal the person capacity you have proposed in your application (the number of people - customers and staff - you plan to accommodate in your establishment). They will give the plans a stamp of approval if they meet safety and building standards, and indicate the occupant load for your establishment on your plans (a separate occupant-load certificate is not sufficient). You will be required to submit your approved floor plans to us later in the application process.

Please note:

Your signs, also, must comply with local bylaws. It is your responsibility to obtain all required approvals. If you later discover you will not be able to operate your establishment, we cannot refund your application or licence fees.

PURPOSE

To consider Bylaw 500.348 for adoption.

BACKGROUND

Bylaw No. 500.348 was introduced and given 1st and 2nd reading on February 24, 2009. This was followed by a Public Hearing held on March 9, 2009. The Board granted 3rd reading for the amendment bylaw on March 24, 2009.

The purpose of this amendment bylaw is to rezone the properties located adjacent to Claudet and Prawn Roads and legally described as Lot 1, District Lot 84, Nanoose District, Plan 47545 from Rural 5 Subdivision District 'D' (RUSD) (2.0 ha minimum parcel size with or without community services) and Lot 2, Plan 47545 and Lot A, Plan VIP80224, Both of District Lot 84, Nanoose District, from Resource Management 3 Subdivision District 'B' (RM3B) (8.0 ha minimum parcel size with or without community services) to Rural 10 (RU10) Subdivision District 'Z' (No further subdivision) in order to facilitate the development of five-lot subdivision with a maximum of one dwelling unit per lot (see Schedule No. 2 for proposed plan of subdivision).

At 3rd reading of this amendment application, the Conditions for Approval include the preparation of a development covenant to be registered on title prior to the amendment bylaw being considered for adoption. This condition, to be completed prior to consideration of 4th reading of the corresponding bylaw, is outlined in *Schedule No. 1*. The applicant has provided the required covenants and it is expected that these document will be registered on title by the April 28, 2009 Board meeting.

DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

Applicant to prepare a section 219 covenant to secure the following conditions. This covenant is to be prepared and registered by the applicant to the satisfaction of the Regional District prior to consideration of 4^{th} reading. Draft covenant document is to be forwarded to the RDN for review prior to registration at Land Title Office, Victoria, BC.

- 2. Design and construct a pedestrian trail in accordance with the Regional District of Nanaimo General Footpath Development Guidelines (to be attached to the Development Agreement).
- 3. Provide one (1) trailhead sign and trail markers as required in consultation with the RDN Recreation and Parks staff and to the satisfaction of the Regional District of Nanaimo.
- 4. Provide suitable barriers at the trailhead entrance to discourage motorized vehicles from utilizing the trail in consultation with the RDN Recreation and Parks staff and to the satisfaction of the Regional District of Nanaimo.

Environmental Management

 The applicant's environmental consultant will provide written certification that the recommendations for mitigation and the conclusions and recommendations set out in the report entitled Biophysical Assessment and General Environmental Management Plan - Development Property, Lots 1 & 2, Plan 47545 and Lot A, Plan VIP80224, DL 84, Nanoose District, prepared by EBA Engineering Consultants Ltd. and dated February 20, 2007 have been carried out in the development of the subject parcels to the satisfaction of the environmental consultant. 2. With respect to Recommendation No. 4 concerning the fenced buffer area for the eagle nest tree, this fence is to be constructed to the Ministry of Environment's Develop with Care: Environmental Guidelines for Urban and Rural Land Development in British Columbia under the supervision of a Qualified Environmental Professional. With respect to signage, a sign to be installed indicating the presence of the eagle nest tree along with educational information.

Hydrogeological Management

The applicant's hydrogeological engineer with current BC certification will provide written certification that the conclusions and recommendations set out in the report titled Amended Preliminary Hydrogeological Assessment Lots 1 & 2, Plan 47545 and Lot A, Plan VIP80224, DL 84, Nanoose District, prepared by EBA Engineering Consultants Ltd. and dated October 28, 2008 have been completed to the engineer's satisfaction.

Vegetation Retention

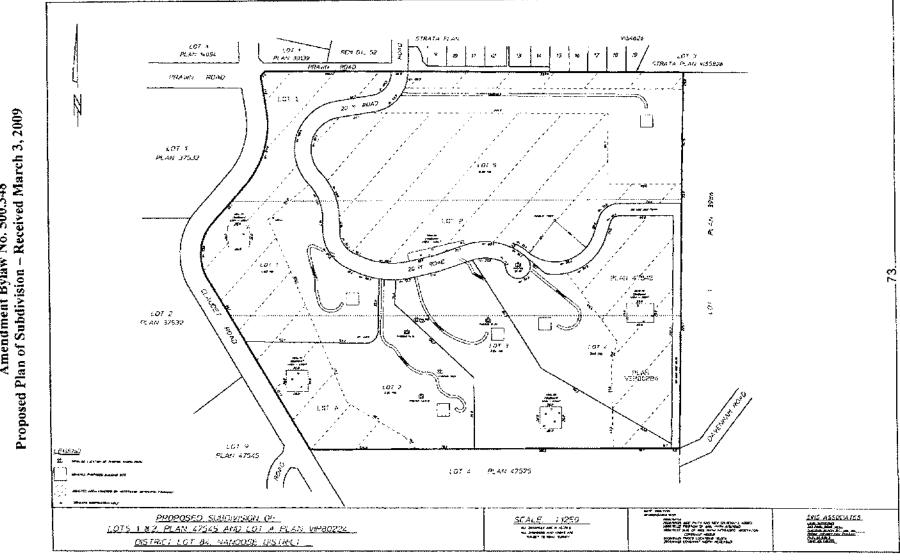
Vegetation will be retained for those areas of the subject parcels as shown on the *Amended* Proposed Subdivision of Lots 1 & 2, Plan 47545 and Lot A, Plan VIP80224, DL 84, Nanoose District, prepared by Sims Associates and dated revision 2009/01/29 (received by RDN March 3, 2009) as shown on Schedule No. 2 and to be attached to the Development Agreement. Submitted images will serve as the base line information for the vegetation retention. Removal of invasive plants or noxious weeds on a small scale within the vegetation retention area including but not limited to Scotch broom, Himalayan blackberry, morning glory, and purple loosestrife, is permitted provided the area is replanted. There shall be no removal of dangerous trees without prior consent of the RDN.

Eagle Nest Tree

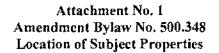

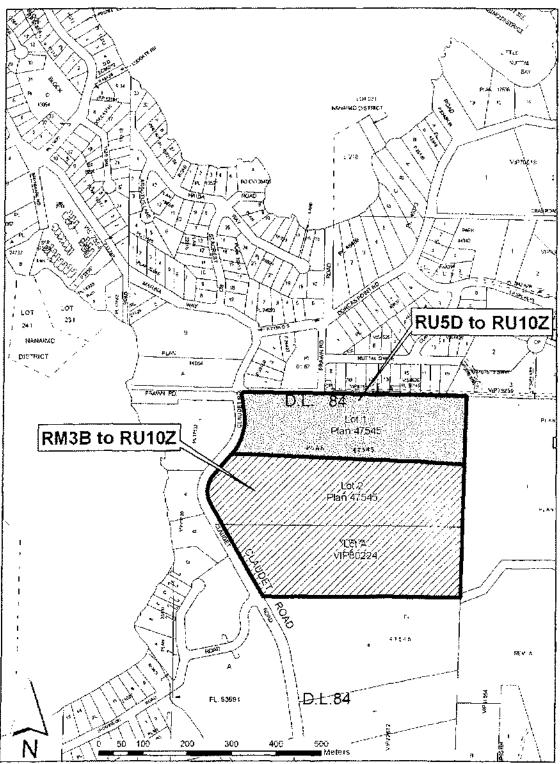

REPORTS

Camping Fees Report

Ms. Marshall reviewed the Camping Fees Report, noting the request for approval to revise the camping and boating fees for Horne Lake and Descanso Bay Regional Parks, was part of an update to the Park use Regulation Bylaw 1399. The current camping fees have been in place since 2004, with the exception of the boat launch fees which were last increased in 2002. The increase in fees will assist the park operators with their operating budgets and also provide opportunity for new business.

The proposed increase would be \$2 per campsite, .50 per head and a small increase to the boat launch fee. The off season rate would be discounted to \$10 per campsite in an effort to increase shoulder season use. Other initiatives include the possibility of a pass to encourage longer stays, a boat launch pass card to decrease administrative paperwork and the phasing out of the strata fee over the next two years.

MOVED T. Westbroek, SECONDED D. Bartram, that the proposed campground fee increases, as listed in Appendix 1, be approved for inclusion in the Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399.

E & N Rail Trail Draft Plan Report

Ms. Marshall reviewed the Rail Trail Feasibility Study which was funded by the Community Tourism grant. The purpose of the study was to review the E & N Rail corridor to see if it was feasible to put a trail within the corridor. The study was a joint effort with all the municipalities with the exception of Nanaimo, who are well underway with their own trail. The study itself just looked at the rail corridor and not the surrounding area, which in many cases already does have established trail which could eventually be used. The prices in the report do not include the cost of river, road or rail crossings, only the trail and subgrade.

Mr. Osborne noted with Board receipt of the report, staff may apply for funding to assist with the project. He stated the draft report indicates a high price tag, however, the information would be refined, broken down into workable sections and staff recommendations regarding the most attainable sections, for example the Parksville to Little Qualicum River Falls Provincial Park, would be presented. A meeting will be held in two weeks time with the municipal administrators to discuss the rail trail and also the Island Corridor Foundation Agreement, which would allow the municipalities and the Regional District to construct a rail trail along the E & N Rail line.

Ms. Marshall noted the standard for the rail trail will be set by the Island Corridor Foundation and the guidelines currently being prepared by staff, with input from other regional districts along the rail line, will also be followed. A separate study on the standards only, was commissioned earlier by all participants from the CRD to Comox Valley Regional District which will also be used as a guide.

MOVED D. Bartram, SECONDED F. Van Eynde, that the E & N Rail Draft Plan Report, be received for information.

Parks Criteria Update

Ms. Marshall reviewed the Regional Park Acquisition Criteria and Rating Framework Study prepared by HB Lanarc. She noted the need for the criteria review flowed out of the work being done on the Development Cost Charges (DCC) Study. During the DCC process questions were raised about what constitutes a regional park type in a municipality and to judge what a regionally significant park is.

The study results provide a more objective look at how parks are acquired, will expand upon the system currently being used and make it more objective and also look at parks in municipalities to see it they could be classified as regionally significant.

During the study process, HB Lanarc reviewed the Regional Parks and Trail Plan, criteria currently in place, and tools used in other communities, regional districts and by conservancy groups. Staff reviewed the information received and the following major values were agreed upon - Conservation Values, Recreation Values, Socio-political Values, Affordability and Other. The major values along with portions of the original park criteria from the Regional Parks and Trails Plan and the addition of water source protection, accessibility, maintenance costs and size make up the new recommended parks criteria.

Mr. Osborne noted a meeting will be held with the municipal administrators in the next few weeks to review the Regional Park Acquisition Criteria and Rating Framework to ensure all agree with the criteria. Once all five jurisdictions are in agreement of the new criteria, it will be used to review municipal parks which they feel may be regionally significant in their jurisdictions. With full agreement of all parties, work may then proceed on the Development Cost Charges Study which was put on hold until the regional park criteria review was complete.

Mt. Benson Regional Park Update

Ms. Marshall noted a Mt. Benson Regional Park Open House to review the Management Plan will be held April 16, 2009, from 4:00 to 8:00pm, at Beban Park to give the public an opportunity to review the plan and give input on their vision for the park.

Monthly Update of Community Parks and Regional Parks and Trails Projects November to February 2009.

Ms. Marshall reviewed the Monthly Update of Community Parks and Regional Parks and Trails Projects for November to February 2009, highlighting the following items:

- Work on the Little Qualicum River Estuary Conservation Area Management Plan is underway. A lease has been forwarded to Ducks Unlimited for their review. Survey work will be done to confirm the boundary at the park.
- Horne Lake Regional Park group campsite has been completed. Work continues on the upgrade to the power system.
- The Fire Control Cost Sharing Agreement has been signed. As part of the agreement a strategic plan must be created on completing management plans for all sites covered under the plan.
- Staff walked the Coats Marsh Regional Park site. A pond leveler is required and will be installed with the assistance of Nature's Trust. Clean up work and a survey of the site and the road in, will be done.

• A new Parks Planner position was approved in the budget. The posting will be out today, for the new position which will be for a regional parks planner. Community Planner Elaine McCulloch will be leaving on maternity leave around July, and a posting for her position will also out today.

MOVED D. Bartram, SECONDED F. Van Eynde, that the Reports be received.

NEW BUSINESS

Opening Ceremonies - Mt. Arrowsmith Massif Regional Park

A meeting was held in January with Peter Rothermel and the Hupacasath First Nation regarding managing the park this year and a possible date for the opening ceremonics. A tentative date of the September 14 weekend was suggested, with the location suggested being in the Parksville Community Park, as it is easily accessible with a good view of Mt. Arrowsmith. A final decision on the location is still to be made. There may also be guided hikes offered over the same weekend, for those who are able to climb the mountain.

Opening Ceremonies - Coats Marsh Regional Park

Opening ceremonies will possibly be held in May, the date still to be confirmed by the Nature's Trust. The ceremonies will be held on the property in front of the marsh.

Canada - BC Building Canada Fund - Nash/Ridgewil Grant Application

Ms. Marshal noted staff are in the process of preparing an application to the Canada – BC Building Canada Fund, to the communities component, for the two bridges, Nash and Ridgewil Creek, on the Lighthouse Country Trail. Included in the application is a request for funding to cover the design and construction of the two bridges, finishing work on the trail and a board walk in the boggy section. There is \$400,000 in the capital budget to cover the two bridges, if funding is received the cost will be reduced from \$575,000 to \$191,000. If the grant application is approved the funds not required for the bridges can be carried over to other future projects.

MOVED D. Bartram, SECONDED F. Van Eynde, that the Regional Board support an application to the Canada-BC Building Canada Fund – Communities Component for a grant to develop bridges, boardwalk and trail along the south loop of the Lighthouse Country Regional Trail in Electoral Area H.

Van Eynde, that the Board of the Regional District of Nanaimo is prepared to cover its share of eligible project costs and all ineligible project costs with respect to the development of bridges, boardwalk and trail along the south loop of the Lighthouse Country Regional Trail in Electoral Area H.

MOVED D. Bartram, SECONDED F. Van Eynde, that the Regional District of Nanaimo commits to operating and maintaining the improved Lighthouse Country Regional Trail.

AVICC Presentation Ed Hughes

Mr. Bartram noted the presentation made by Mr. Ed Hughes, at the Association of Vancouver Island Coastal Communities meeting, held in Nanaimo. Mr. Hughes suggested regional districts should contact woodlot owners who may be interested in doing forestry in woodlots as a way to create revenue. He noted an example of the Comox Regional District which receives approximately \$80,000 per year in woodlot revenue. Mr. Bartram suggested staff investigate the possibility of woodlot revenue.

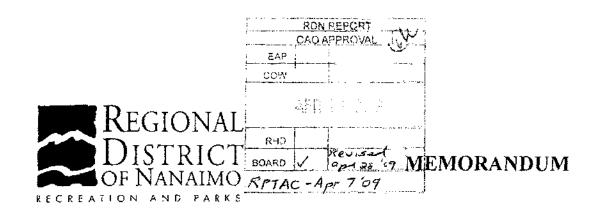

PURPOSE

To seek Board approval to revise the camping and boating fees for Horne Lake and Descanso Bay Regional Parks as part of an update to Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399.

BACKGROUND

Year-round camping and boat launching fees at Horne Lake Regional Park (HLRP) and Descanso Bay Regional Park (DBRP) were initially set in 2002, the year the two parks were acquired. The fees were later adjusted upwards in the fall of 2004 when Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399 was introduced. RDN campground fees have always been set in line with posted BC Park rates for comparable campgrounds, though it should be noted that posted rates do not reflect common surcharges and the substantial cost of reserving a BC Park campsite (over \$6 per night). Appendix I shows the history of campground fees at HLRP and DBRP.

It is now proposed that high and low season camping fees along with discounts or passes be established at HLRP and DBRP in order to better serve campers and boaters, make more efficient use of park assets especially in the spring and fall, and increase the revenues that support park operators and the service they provide to the public. The proposed RDN campground fee changes mirror the direction being taken by the Province at this time. Their process began in early 2008 with new regulations moving the authority to set park fees from the Cabinet to the Minister. A November 2008 BC Parks fee review suggested a range of fee and access proposals with a view to increasing use of parks, better targeting fees to users, and increasing revenues for park operators. The first changes are to involve discounts and packages and are planned to begin taking effect in late May 2009 with fee increases planned to follow in 2010. The Province is also examining long-stay options for low occupancy parks and shoulder seasons, along with a number of other changes related to BC Parks' well developed complex of services.

The 2009 Proposed Fees schedule (Appendix I) presents the RDN campground fee schedule proposed for implementation in the spring of 2009. The primary change between existing and proposed fees is a higher camping fee for mid-May to mid-September and a discounted camping fee for the balance of the year. For example, HLRP waterfront sites would rise from \$22 to \$24 per site during the late spring and

summer, but would lower to \$10 per site during the balance of the year. This discount should help increase RDN campground usage in the off-season particularly April, May, September and October when occupancy rates typically plummet to less than 25 percent of summer occupancy rates – see Descanso Bay's occupancy history below.

Descanso Bay Regional Park

A 'Camp for \$10!' program will be easy to market and indications are that the Province will likely also adopt it. In all cases and with the aim of increasing occupancy, it is at the Park Operator's discretion to offer camping fee discounts or programmed recreation – camping packages that include discounted camping fees. The current HLRP operator has been offering packages for some years and the DBRP operator will be exploring the introduction of programmed activities that could be packaged with camping.

Other proposed RDN fee changes include an increase in the non-profit group camping fee from \$2.00 to \$2.50 and in the boat launch fee from \$5.00 to \$6.00, the first increase in either fee since 2002. With the proposed launch pass, frequent boat launchers may see no rise in overall launch costs while the Park Operator will enjoy reduced administrative costs to service this clientele. It is also proposed that the special boat launch rate enjoyed by some Horne Lake Strata members since the Park's inception be eliminated now that the Strata development has matured and more launches have been installed around the lake. Last, the introduction of a high season extra vehicle pass should help increase the number of campers who stay seven days or longer at a time, currently an insignificant class of campers at either RDN campground park.

In general, Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399 requires amendment in order that the list of park and trail properties covered by the Bylaw may be updated and a small number of minor administrative updates carried out. The proposed Bylaw 1399 Schedule B campground fee changes discussed above constitute the only significant proposed change to Bylaw 1399. It is noted that when Bylaw 1399 was disseminated for public review as part of its introduction in 2004, no feedback on then proposed campground fee changes was received.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. That the proposed campground fee increases, as listed in Appendix I, be approved for inclusion in the Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399.
- 2. To maintain current campground fees and provide alternative direction.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Increased campground fees will help contribute to the viability of park operations at HLRP and DBRP, two relatively small campgrounds with limited profitability. The RDN's Park Operators are responsible for providing high quality service from reservations to enforcement. Campgrounds are inherently labour intensive and ensuring adequate and qualified staffing is a constant issue. Both HLRP and DBRP are roughly developed which places additional operating and maintenance demands on campground staff. The proposed changes to campground fees, changes in keeping with those proposed for BC Parks, will ensure the Park Operators see some profit for the quality service they provide while at the same time contribute to the development of new business through more flexible provision of camping services.

CITIZEN IMPLICATIONS

Camping fees at RDN campgrounds have always been kept in line with those for BC Parks and have not constituted an issue with the consuming public since the campgrounds were inaugurated in 2002. The move to a deep off-season discount and high-frequency use passes should prove popular with campground users.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

Camping provides an opportunity for the public to enjoy experiences in the natural environment. Except for the vehicle travel to the site, camping is low energy consuming when compared to hotel stays. Having campgrounds in the RDN gives the opportunity to local families to vacation in nature without having to travel great distances. However, in order for the business to stay viable for the park operators, the fees charged must off set expenses incurred.

SUMMARY

A package of campground fee changes is proposed for Horne Lake and Descanso Bay Regional Parks. These changes feature modest increases in high-season camping fees combined with a deep discount in off-season camping (mid-September to mid-May). Other proposed changes include an increase in boat launch fee, and introduction of high-frequency boat launch and extra vehicle parking passes. Table 1 at the end of this report details the proposed RDN changes. The proposed changes to campground fees will help ensure the continued viability of Park Operator business at the two campground parks as well as provide opportunity for new business. The proposed changes are also consistent with BC Park's current efforts to revise their campground fee schedule with a view to increasing revenue generation at parks while at the same time enhancing the variability and flexibility of pricing options and services available to campground users.

The Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399 requires other amendments in order to list recently acquired park and trail properties covered by the Bylaw and a small number of minor administrative updates. The proposed Bylaw 1399 Schedule B campground fee changes constitute the only significant proposed change to Bylaw 1399. A subsequent report will be forthcoming to adopt all the amendments to Bylaw 1399.

RECOMMENDATION

That the proposed campground fee increases, as listed in Appendix I, be approved for inclusion in the Park Use Regulation Bylaw 1399.

PURPOSE

To obtain Board approval to negotiate a contract with International Composting Corporation to process food and yard waste delivered to RDN disposal facilities.

BACKGROUND

In 2005, the Board approved the Organics Diversion Strategy, a plan to provide the Board, the general public, and the business community with information on how organic waste will be diverted from disposal. This strategy was developed in accordance with the RDN Zero Waste Plan, which identifies organics diversion as a key component of reaching the goal of 75% diversion of solid waste from landfill by 2010.

The Strategy has two main components: a ban on the disposal of food waste from the commercial sector and the collection of food waste from single-family residences. The Board approved a ban on the disposal of commercial food waste at RDN facilities in 2005. Since 2006 this program has diverted roughly 3,700 tonnes of food waste annually from local businesses such as grocery stores and restaurants to the International Composting Corporation facility at Duke Point.

With respect to the collection of food waste from single-family residences, since 2007 a successful field test has been operating on three collection routes in the City of Nanaimo, the Town of Qualicum Beach and Electoral Area A. Based on twelve months of data and extrapolated to all 50,000 single-family residences in the RDN, a residential food waste collection program could divert an additional 6,000 tonnes of food waste from the landfill. Consequently, in September 2008 the Board directed that food waste be added to the upcoming tender for the RDN Garbage Collection & Recycling Service for implementation in April 2010.

Since that time staff has been working to ensure that the infrastructure is in place to provide for this service. With respect to collection, staff has pre-qualified three firms to respond to a request for proposals (RFP) to collect garbage, food waste and recyclable materials from 25,000 single-family households serviced by the RDN program. The RFP will be issued by the end of April, will close in June and staff expects to recommend award in July.

With respect to transfer, construction will begin in August on the retrofit, redevelopment and expansion of the Church Road Transfer Station to manage garbage, organics and recyclable materials generated in the northern community service area for the next 20 years. The food waste transfer component of this project will be completed by April 2010. The only infrastructure element remaining is a long-term contract to process residential food waste as well as yard waste delivered to RDN disposal facilities.

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Date:	April 16, 2009
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Currently, commercial food waste collected by private haulers and yard waste delivered to RDN facilities is processed at the International Composting Corporation (ICC) facility at Duke Point. The presence of ICC in Nanaimo has been essential to the implementation of the commercial food waste ban as well as the residential field test. In 2002, ICC decided to locate their composting facility in the RDN based on the Board's 1999 resolution to ban commercial organics from disposal once appropriate composting facilities were in place. Their decision was also predicated on Board policy to establish a licensing system to ensure a level playing field between organics processing facilities.

Since that time ICC, which was licensed in 2006, has invested over S5 million in their facility in the City of Nanaimo. Recently ICC announced plans for a \$7.5 million project to process organic wastes into biofuels as well as compost. This project has already received \$2.5 million in funding from the provincial Innovative Clean Energy (ICE) fund and if successful could provide an integrated solution to turn both organic wastes and biosolids into clean energy.

ICC is currently diverting 12,500 tonnes of organic food and yard waste from landfill annually. Because the RDN does not collect food waste from the commercial sector, since implementing the commercial food waste ban in 2006, there has been no formal contractual agreement between the RDN and ICC to process this material. With the implementation of organics diversion programs in the residential sector, the Board will need to consider whether to enter into a long-term contract with ICC or to consider other options.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Negotiate a contract with ICC to provide a food and yard waste processing service.
- 2. Issue a tender to existing licensed facilities on Vancouver Island to provide the service.
- 3. Request proposals from qualified firms to construct a new compost facility to provide the service.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Alternative I

ICC currently charges the RDN \$85 per tonne to process food waste and \$40 per tonne to process yard waste. Preliminary discussions with ICC indicate that these costs could be reduced under a long-term contract. Currently plans are to collect the food wastes at the landfill and transfer them to ICC. Cost recovery would be through tipping fees established to recover the cost of transfer and disposal which in the case of food waste would be slightly lower than the \$105 tonne fee for garbage. The cost to individual residents would be recovered through the annual user fee for the garbage, food waste and recyclables collection service contract which will not be known until the upcoming RFP process is completed.

Alternative 2

ICC is currently the only licensed facility in the RDN. Although there is one other licensed facility on Vancouver Island located at Cobble Hill, its current fee is higher than ICC and given the cost and carbon emissions associated with transportation it is unlikely that this facility could provide a lower-cost alternative to ICC.

Alternative 3

There are several other firms with proven technologies to process food and yard waste into compost however none of them have constructed facilities on Vancouver Island. Although a new firm may be able to offer the service at lower cost than ICC, this could not be determined until an RFP process was completed in six to twelve months. Furthermore, even if the RFP process did result in a lower cost option than ICC, given the time associated with siting, permitting and construction of a new facility, implementation of food waste collection would be delayed until sometime in 2012.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

Organics diversion is one of the cheapest and most effective strategies to address climate change as well as to conserve expensive landfill space. Under Alternative 1, if the Board awards a contract to ICC and implements a residential food waste collection service in 2010, the production of greenhouse gases at the Regional Landfill will be reduced by 10,000 tonnes by 2012. Neither of the other two alternatives will provide the same environmental benefits in such a short time frame.

SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS

A region-wide food waste collection program contributes to the sustainability of the RDN by providing benefits to the environment, economy and residents. Diverting food waste to a composting facility reduces the generation of methane, a potent greenhouse gas. Food waste diversion also extends the life of the landfill thereby avoiding the cost of additional expensive disposal capacity. Processing food waste and other organic material at ICC also generates local jobs producing fertilizers, soil amendments and potentially biofuels, thereby enhancing the local economy. Finally, food waste collection as well as recycling programs provides residents with the opportunity to make effective and meaningful contributions toward mitigating climate change.

SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

In September 2008 the Board directed that food waste be added to the upcoming tender for RDN Garbage Collection & Recycling Service for implementation in April 2010. Since that time staff has been working to ensure that the infrastructure is in place to provide for this service. Although plans for collection and transfer are well underway, the only outstanding infrastructure element to be addressed is a long-term contract to process food and yard waste delivered to RDN disposal facilities. ICC, which is currently the only licensed facility in the RDN, charges \$85 per tonne to process food waste and \$40 per tonne to process yard waste. Preliminary discussions with ICC indicate that these costs could be reduced under a long-term contract. Although there are other companies that may be able to provide this service at lower cost, due to the time associated with siting, permitting and constructing a new facility, implementation of the cheapest and most effective strategies to address climate change, staff believes that a contract for processing food and yard waste delivered to RDN disposal facilities should be negotiated with ICC.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Board direct staff to negotiate a contract with International Composting Corporation to process food and yard waste delivered to RDN disposal facilities.
