## CALL TO ORDER

Chair McPherson called the meeting to order at 7:09 PM.

#### DELEGATIONS

#### Deborah Blum – Pace Road Beach Access

Ms. Blum gave her opinion that the property that allowed access between Pace Rd and Shasta Rd in the past is now not accessible due to the new owners of the property blocking the private access that was once available to locals. She suggested that a small trail down to the beach would be a substantial improvement to the existing lack of access.

## Tom & Sabine Molfenter -Shasta Road Beach Access

Mr. Molfenter recapped his submission to the committee regarding the walking loop through the "40 acre piece'. With the new ownership there is now blocked access through that property. In his original submission he had wanted to express his desire to continue to have a walking loop which is why he had suggested that a loop could be maintained by developing MoTI water accesses which would facilitate access to a beach loop walk. However since his submission it had come to his attention that they do have an opportunity to maintain access through the '40 acre' property and that that would be their preference over the beach access to beach access link. They would like to keep the current beach accesses accessible but discreet as they are.

# Daniel & Patricia Johnston - Shasta Road Beach Access

Mr. Johnston spoke about the path that had been used for trail for a long time by community members. He mentioned that the Fish Club members had had a meeting to discuss the issue of having access to the property. There was a strong sentiment that the community should be able to continue to enjoy access to the beach with consideration to privacy and the challenges with parties, fires, safety, etc with the public on the beaches. He'd like to see the community work together to find a way to do that without any significant involvement of the RDN. There ways to make a trail without a significant cost.

He noted the unfortunate loss of the access to the '40 acre' property but sees the beach access development as a way to continue that enjoyment so long as safety is regarded in accessing the beach. Headland, Driftwood, Shasta(drop). Headland is most important access back up to Pace Rd., Holden Corso, need that access on headland to do that loop.

MOVED P. Grand, SECONDED B. White to receive the late delegation.

Adam Paters, a member of the gallery (was not clear on the name) asked Chair McPherson if the RDN would consider a letter from community members requesting the RDN require a trail connection through the subject property.

Chair McPherson answered that at subdivision a property owner is not required to dedicate parkland as long as the resulting lots are over 2 hectares in size; and there is no requirement for public amenities. He explained some of the land issues with the property from his knowledge and what will need to be done.

# Robert Scott – 2303 Ravenhill Rd.

Mr. Scott acknowledged that many local residents have used the trail route through private property which links Shasta Rd. and Pace Rd. and that this is an important trail loop within the community. He recognized that the new owners no longer permit public access through their property. He requested that the RDN ask for a public trail connection through the property as a requirement through subdivision.

Chair McPherson explained the RDN development procedure, OCP considerations, etc.

Commissioner Fiddick said there are 28 beach accesses and only 2 are developed. He said that he would like to see more developed as they are a public access point, not private accesses.

# **Community Works Fund**

Chair McPherson gave a history of how the Community Works Funds came to be and how the funds are used and the new criteria that has been added for use for recreation facilities. The funds can also not be spent all on one item. He noted that it is estimated that EA 'A' would receive \$290,000 for 2014/2015.

# Morden Colliery Regional Trail – Nanaimo River Bridge

Chair McPherson updated that he attended the Regional Parks and Trails Select Committee and the engineer has come up with two concepts for the bridge - a suspension bridge and a truss bridge. When the report is complete, he would like this committee to send their feedback to the board on their preference of the structure type.

Commissioner Fiddick reported that the Cedar Horse Club has been working with Kelsey Cramer about putting up some trail courtesy signs on the trail. He showed the committee the mockup of the proposed sign. He said they started with Hemer Park and because many riders ride through Morden Colliery Regional Trail, he worked with Ms. Cramer to get those up in there as well.

# **Morden Colliery Tipple Engineering Report**

Chair McPherson updated that the Friends of Morden Mine have written to the Minister and asked for a contribution towards the funding for the engineering report. They were hoping to receive a response before the RFP goes out and have not heard back as of this date.

**Chair McPherson** questioned whether the RDN should be offering some cultural programs and noted that this is a topic to discuss in the upcoming planning session.

Ms. McCulloch noted that some of the Commission's grants are given to culture groups for their programs.

**Commissioner Thornton** commented that what he feels is missing is an identity for the area.

**Commissioner Grand** commented that the culture in the community is like a well-kept secret and its time to expose the secret.

**Commissioner Mead** noted that there is a new pharmacy in town and that she appreciates the growing number of services provided in Cedar. The skateboard park opening was a great turn out with the breath of age groups. She checked out beach access #6 and will continue going there.

**Commissioner White** updated the members on some of the key themes he took away from attending the BCRPA Symposium. He will review more at the recreation planning discussion this upcoming September. The theme of the conference was 'Connections' and the continued message he got from each session is the importance of a leader, coordinator, or entity being responsible for bringing the community together with programs. He feels the community has lost that with the loss of the programmer in 2012 and that it is going to be a long road to get that momentum of community connection back. We must find a new source of leadership to pull it all together again; perhaps funds will have to be found to put towards someone or some association to get that connection back.

Chair McPherson notes that the RDN has other areas that are run as a society and that is something this commission can look at to shepherd the recreation in this area. This could be put in the next agenda for discussion as an item to be discussed and budgeted for.

**Chair McPherson** remarked that the community needs a gathering place and whether that is through the RDN or through development remains to be seen but it's definitely important to the community.

A skate park, I think, carries a reputation of being a sight were kids (and teenagers) tend to get themselves in trouble. Whether it be peer pressure, alcohol and drugs, graffiti, and bullying. I have discussed this with many parents, while standing around the edge of the park observing new tricks and the fun being had. What a great way to be active!



# PURPOSE

To consider a request for acceptance of park land dedication on property in Electoral Area 'A'.

## BACKGROUND

The Regional District has received an application for a subdivision of the above-noted property, which is located adjacent to Walsh Road (North) and MacMillan Road (West), in the Cedar area of Electoral Area 'A,' and is 0.8 ha (2 acres) in size (see Attachment 1 for location of subject property).

The proposed subdivision would not create three or more new parcels; therefore, no park land dedication is required pursuant to Section 941 of the *Local Government Act*. However, the applicant proposes to voluntarily dedicate 0.4 hectare (1.0 acre), approximately 50% of the parent parcel, as park land *(see Attochment 2 for proposed plan af subdivision)*. This dedication consists of wetland located within the Nanaimo River Floodplain in the York Lake area. Accessibility through the wetland is limited by high water levels extending beyond the limits of the proposed park land dedication.

## ALTERNATIVES

- 1. To accept the offer of park land dedication in the amount and location as set in Attachment 2.
- 2. To deny the offer for dedication of park land.

## PARK LAND IMPLICATIONS

The Electoral Area 'A' Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 1620, 2011 contains park land policies, which stipulate that park land is desirable

• Where it would provide trail linkages ar future trail linkoges or the expansion of existing parks forming interconnected notural corridors. In this case, with the addition of other surrounding

parkland in the future, there may be an opportunity to develop trail linkages along York Lake that would provide a direct, off-road travel route between Cedar Village and MacMillan Road (near Cedar Secondary Community School). Additionally, there are two existing parks (A-10 & A-13) directly across Macmillan Road from the proposed parkland dedication, both of which consist almost entirely of wetland habitat. These parks may have potential for a boardwalk trail system that could link the three parks together;

- If it is an environmentally sensitive area. In this case, the proposed park is composed entirely of wetland habitat;
- Where it would provide passive outdoor use. Wetland areas typically provide excellent bird watching opportunities. These opportunities would be enhanced if a trail/boardwalk/bird blind were to be developed in the proposed park;
- Where it would provide viewpoints or opportunities for nature appreciation. The location of the proposed park, adjacent to Macmillan Road provides a significant view into the wetland and would help preserve an important open space vista within the community.

In addition to the OCP, the *Electoral Area 'A' Community Trails Study (2002)* recommends trail connections through/around York Lake as a high priority for acquisition. The study identifies York Lake as being located along a direct travel route between destinations such as residential housing, schools and the shopping centre. The study suggests that trails through this area would provide shortcuts and get foot traffic off the busy Cedar Road.

Furthermore, the Trails Study recommends that the RDN negotiate with willing landowners who have property around the lake so as to obtain a public access through the wetland and around the lake.

# Area 'A' Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission

The proposal for the proposed park land dedication was referred to the Electoral Area 'A' Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission at its meeting of January 19, 2011. The Commission supports the proposed park land dedication in conjunction with the proposed subdivision.

# SUMMARY/CONCLUSIONS

The applicant has proposed to voluntarily dedicate 0.4 hectare (1.0 acre), approximately 50% of the parent parcel, as park land *(see Attachment 2 for proposed plan of subdivision)*. No park land dedication is required pursuant to Section 941 of the *Local Government Act*. The proposed park land dedication would accomplish many of Electoral Area 'A' the Official Community Plan parks objectives.

# RECOMMENDATION

That the proposed park dedication in the proximity of York Lake be accepted in conjunction with a proposed subdivision as shown on Attachment 2.







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# 2014 Electoral Area 'A' Timeline: Provision of Recreation Programming & Services

**2004 November** -Staff were directed by the Board to undertake a Recreation Services Study for Electoral Area 'A' which included a survey. The survey results were inconclusive and direction was given to proceed to a referendum to seek formal elector assent to establish a recreation service function in Electoral Area 'A'.

**2005 May**- The survey was conducted to determine the level of satisfaction with the current recreation services provided for Area 'A' residents and gauge support for the creation of a local recreation service function. The survey explored the following issues:

- What recreation services are currently being used by the residents
- What the community needs, interests and priorities for recreation services for children, youth and adults
- Parks and recreation facility needs in the community for children, youth and adults
- Support for alternative recreation service delivery systems
- Level of support for funding local recreation through taxation
- Support for the existing agreement with the City of Nanaimo to access recreation and parks services

Also as over this time period three service delivery alternatives were initially proposed regarding the provision of recreation and cultural services in Electoral Area 'A'. These included: the formation of a Society to provide the service through an agreement with the RDN, similar to what is currently in place on Gabriola Island, entering into an agreement with an existing society (such as the Cedar School and Community Enhancement Society\* or the Comets Sports Recreation and Culture Society\*), and the creation of a Board appointed Recreation and Culture Commission with staff hired by the RDN to provide and administer the service, similar to service delivery in District 69.

\*The preference expressed by both organizations was that RDN provide the service by either establishing a new Society or directly through the RDN.

**2005** November - Electoral Area 'A' Residents voted in favour of establishing a new recreation and culture service function and approved Bylaw 1467. The function gave the RDN the ability to provide and fund local recreation and culture services and to acquire, construct and operate recreation and culture facilities in Electoral Area 'A'. However, residents may continue to use recreation facilities, fields and services operated by the City of Nanaimo as provided for them in District 68 Sports Field and Recreation Services Agreement.

**2006 March** – The RDN Regional Board endorsed a Terms of Reference that outlined a process to undertake a Recreation and Cultural Services Master Plan project for EA 'A'. The plan was completed in the spring of 2007 and a Recreation and Culture Commission was established to oversee the planning and implementation process.

**2007-** November **7** - The date of the inaugural Recreation and Culture Commission meeting. The focus of the commission was to address local recreation services

**2008** November- RDN board approved the Electoral 'A' Recreation and Culture Commission and the Electoral Area 'A' parks and Green space Advisory Committee be dissolved. Staff were directed to develop a terms of reference for an Electoral Area 'A' Parks Recreation and Culture Commission for consideration by the Regional Board in January 2009.

**2008**- Options for the delivery of direct programming were considered and explored over the course of the year. The first was to partner with and expand the existing Community School recreation programming (matching funds from RDN to be provided to cover cost of SD staff). The second was that the RDN retain a coordinator to provide recreation and cultural services directly. There was also some discussion as to whether the person would be hired as a staff member or on a contract basis.

**2009 January**- Terms of Reference for the Parks Recreation and Culture Commission were adopted by the RDN Board

**2009** January- Unfortunately by the fall of 2008 negotiations with the School District were proving unsuccessful and consequently, the Commission recommended to the Board the hiring of a full time Programmer. RDN staff advised that additional funding would be required to provide this service model, but that it would offer more control and autonomy. Staff also advised that this model would involve securing an office location and acquiring equipment and supplies. A permanent full time union position was hired (Recreation Programmer) later in 2009 and direct programming services commenced.

**2010 January**- Electoral Area 'A' Parks Recreation and Culture Workshop was held to review the 2007 Master Plan items.

**2010-2012**- The Area 'A' recreation programmer was responsible for overseeing direct program services and was involved in various community events and initiatives. Programs were offered in conjunction with and planned so as not to overlap programs offered by other area providers such as the Community School Coordinators, Cedar School and Enhancement Society.

Program examples include:

- Baby Steps Dance
- Soccer Tots
- Little Kickers Preschool Soccer
- Creative Dance
- Winter Break Camp
- Leaders in Training

- Summer Camps
- Boot Camp
- Get Fit
- Jewellery
- Art Classes

**2012 April** 1- The Regional Board provided direction to discontinue this service following a review of the recreation service delivery model in Electoral Area 'A' and its related budget requirements. The service was considered by the Board too expensive in its current format. As a result, direct recreation programming and coordination services have been discounted as of April 1, the Regional District decided to focus on the promotion of the Community Recreation Grants Program and setting aside funds for future recreation facilities for the rural community.

**2012** June- preliminary discussions were held regarding the planning of a future multi use indoor facility in the area and what level of study could be taken to proceed to the next steps were held

**2012 November 4-** Commission planning session reviewed the 2007 Recreation and Culture Master Plan recommendations and reviewed the steps needing to be taken to build a recreational facility (see attached documents)

**2013 April-** Commission toured North Cedar Intermediate and Woodbank schools to determine suitability of space for the purposes of providing community recreation programming

# **Current Recreation Services Delivery Models within the RDN**

Gabriola Recreation Society (GRS)

- Three year term agreement between RDN and GRS
- GRS has been in existence since 2002
- Year round recreation programs offered
- GRS primarily uses classroom space at Gabriola Elementary School
- Oversees maintenance contract of Rollo McClay Fields
- 1 FTE
- Funded through Gabriola Island tax requisition
- Maintains own website, linked to from RDN site

Electoral Area 'F'- Arrowsmith Recreation Community Association (ACRA)

- Three year term agreement between RDN and ACRA formerly Arrowsmith Community enhancement Society (ACES)
- In existence since 2008
- Provide supplementary recreation programs to those offered by Northern Recreation Services (RDN programming team)
- 1 FTE
- Funded by way of tax requisition from Northern Electoral Areas (all contributing)

Other Electoral Areas (E, G, H, F, City of Parksville and Town of Qualicum) contribute to the overall District 69 (Northern Recreation) Recreation Services budget. Programming staff is responsible for the development and implementation of programs within the District 69 jurisdiction
